November of 1929 In Douglas Patterson moved his family from Nova Scotia into the newly for sale Van Horn Mansion. The family would prove to be as beloved community members as the Van Horns had. Every winter Mr. Patterson constructed a hockey rink on their estate, filling it with water from help by the local fire companies. Everyone in the community was invited to skate there, young and old alike. Mrs. Patterson offered her hot cocoa to the visitors, and allowed them to walk through the mansion with guard-covered skates on, not worried in the least about soiling the carpets. Many locals were thrilled; this was the first chance for many to get a glimpse inside the well-known brick home.

The definition of advent means the arrival of an important person or event. In Christianity, Advent is the four week period between St. Andrew's Day and Christ's birth, which has been celebrated since the fourth century. It marked the time in which new converts to the faith prepared for baptism.

By the 1800's, German Lutherans had a tradition of marking their front doors with chalk lines each day during Advent. This tradition We're currently busy decorating the Van Horn Mansion for Christmastime- we hope you stop by and see the beautiful decorations. The best day to come is Sunday, December 6 for our annual Carol Sing. The holiday music helps make the mansion even more memorable. If you've never attended before than this is the year!




### **Bacon and Egg Casserole**

5 slices buttered bread, cubed
3/4 lb. shredded cheese
1/2 lb. bacon, partially cooked and coarsely chopped
4 eggs, slightly beaten
2 c. milk
1 tsp. dry mustard
1/2 tsp. salt
dash pepper

In a greased 9x13 baking dish, layer ingredients as follows - bread, cheese, then bacon. Mix together eggs, milk and spices - pour over layered ingredients. Refridgerate overnight. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour. This is good for Christmas brunch - make the night

before and bake in the morning.


### Colonial Virginia Christmas Traditions

While most of the American colonies did not celebrate Christmas, Virginians held a fortnight of celebrations stretching from Christmas Eve to Twelfth Night on January 6th. "All over the colony, a universal hospitality reigns," reported one London Magazine in 1746, "and throughout the Twelve Days of Christmas, Virginians made the most of that spirit."

Time was spent visiting friends or receiving guests, and great parties were held filled with dancing, singing and partying well into the night. Homes were decked out with wreaths and



garlands of holly & ivy, balls of mistletoe and scented clusters of lavender, rosemary, and spices. Christmas Dinner consisted of 7-8 courses in wealthy households, and included oysters, crab, and other fish; roast beef, smoked ham, roast turkey, venison, and a wealth of game, all alongside stuffing, roast vegetables, biscuits and cornbread. Desserts were a delightful assortment of pies, tarts, puddings, cakes and sweets.

Completely unknown to early American colonists were two of our most cherished traditions: Santa Claus and the Christmas tree, both of which only grew popular the U.S. in the nineteenth century. Gifts were given at Christmastime, but usually only from masters to their servants and apprentices. Over the centuries, colonial Christmas traditions melded with those of new immigrants to make Christmas in America what we know it as today. (continued from page 1)...this time that the holiday transitioned to a month-long celebration leading into Christmas, making everyone's calendars dates start at December 1st and go through the 24th.

Now that the calendars had firm dates, families crafted longer lasting homemade Advent calendars out of cloth, wood and paper. They were simple, flat decorations to hang on the wall in December. Sometime after 1890 various retail shops in Germany and Switzerland began selling these basic Advent decorations. A few newspapers are known to have printed versions in their Sunday editions.

German printer Gerhard Lang is credited with inventing the modern version of the Advent Calendar. As a child his mother would make one each year, and she attached little candies for him to each date on the cardboard decoration. As an adult he became a printer, co-owning the printing office Reichhold & Lang. In 1908 he decided to honor his mother and Christmas with a new product: a beautifully printed cardboard Christmas Calendar which came with 24 separate little colored pictures, one to hang up on each day of Advent. He sold them to his clients, which included a German newspaper who inserted them



in a late November edition as a gift to their customers.

By the following year Lang modified his calendars by gluing two pieces of cardboard together which now formed little doors that could be opened to view a surprise for each day: unique and pretty Christmas pictures. His new Advent Calendars were a commercial success, and Reichhold & Lang became known throughout Germany. Not long after, the Sankt

Johannis Printing Company started producing religious Advent Calendars, with Bible verses instead of pictures behind the doors.

These modern Advent calendars remained popular and spread throughout Europe for the next two decades. During this time Lang created over 30 different versions. Unfortunately World War II halted the calendar printing due to a cardboard shortage, and later a law in Germany which stopped the production of calendars with pictures. Reichold & Lang were forced to close forever in the late 1930's.

The tradition quickly returned after the war, newly designed and printed by Richard Sellmer beginning in 1946. His first calendar was called "The Little Town". Richard Sellmer Advent Calendars are still produced today, including reprints of the original "The Little Town". Sellmers has some very sought after designs, including original vintage calendars and 3D standing versions. You can visit their website and see many of their classic designs on display: www.sellmer-verlag.de.

By the 1950's Advent Calendars were popular throughout Europe. All were designed with 24 little numbered doors to be opened each day from Dec. 1st through Christmas Eve. Inside children might find a Christmas picture, a religious picture, a bible verse, or - starting in 1958 – a small piece of candy (in honor of Lang and his mother).

A copy of Sellmer's "The Little Town" Advent Calendar was given to President Dwight D. Eisenhower in the mid 1950's.

Several newspapers printed a photo of Eisenhower opening the calendar with his grandchildren. They were an instant hit with readers, establishing the popular tradition in the United States.

Paper versions of the Advent Calendar became standard decorations for the next fifty years and were must have items for December- even with families who weren't very religious. They were important



for some to teach about the birth of Christ, while in other homes it is the countdown to the arrival of Santa Claus. Some calendars even have a 25th door to be opened on Christmas Day.

Occasionally families in America and Europe preferred to create their own. It was a popular craft for young children to build, including paper chains, hanging decorations, little envelopes and more. In the 1960's some families began creating or buying permanent calendars to use each year, such as a little wooden Christmas trees with a new ornament to hang each day. However the paper versions sold in stores remained the most popular type until the 21st century.

Modern Advent Calendars come in all shapes, sizes and themes, and many paper versions are still sold each year- most now include little chocolates. However permanent Advent Calendars are quickly becoming the most commonly owned variety. There are wooden trains, trees and houses, all with little drawers that contain small candies or gifts. There are wall calendars with pockets, fridge magnet designs, hanging garlands, felt kits, clocks and far too many other types than we could ever list! Of course we have to mention one more: the most expensive Advent Calendar ever made. It was carved from elm and walnut wood, shaped like a Christmas tree with...(continued on page 5) *(continued from page 4)...24* compartments holding organic chocolates from Green & Black. They were sold in 2007 at London's famous Harrods Department Store for \$50,000, with

proceeds going to support cocoa farmers.

While they may look completely different than a century ago, their goal of counting the days until C h r i s t m a s hasn't. Of course some people dislike the new versions with



daily gift-giving, believing this detracts from the message of Christ or the true reason for the calendar's creation. Yet the massive variety of Advent Calendars today ensures every family can celebrate the tradition in whatever way suits them best. After all, wonderful family memories are the most important holiday gift anyone could ever give or receive- and that may be the best reason of all for the long lasting life of the Advent Calendar.  $\blacklozenge$
